
PNC Financial Services Group PNC -0.95% ▼ has agreed to buy a Colorado-based bank in a \$4.1 billion deal intended to advance its national ambitions by extending its presence in the West.

Already one of the largest banks in the U.S., Pittsburgh-based PNC wants to better position itself as a coast-to-coast lender with enough scale to compete against larger rivals. The deal to buy privately held FirstBank Holding accelerates that ambition, PNC Chief Executive Bill Demchak said in an interview.

The cash-and-stock deal would bring PNC closer in size to rivals such as <u>U.S. Bancorp</u> and <u>Capital One Financial</u>, with its total assets set to rise to just under \$600 billion. PNC said it would retain FirstBank's nearly 100 branches in Colorado and Arizona, with some \$27 billion in assets.

Demchak called FirstBank a "perfect fit" for PNC, with loyal, low-cost retail deposits in key markets where it also plans to grow its commercial and corporate businesses. (PNC and FirstBank even share orange logos, he noted, in slightly different shades.)

Bank executives and dealmakers are anticipating a wave of consolidation in the industry under the Trump administration, which is expected to take a friendlier approach to proposed tie-ups. Activity has started to pick up somewhat, though economic uncertainty, higher interest rates and <u>a regulatory hangover</u> from the previous administration have kept some executives on the sidelines.

PNC executives left the door open to future deals. The eighth-largest bank in the U.S. by assets, it is positioned as a natural consolidator. Demchak has stoked excitement on Wall Street after pointed comments about the need for banks to scale up to stay competitive.

Demchak said PNC has strong organic growth and will "see what shows up next."

PNC has moved to build out its morethan-2,000-branch network in recent years. It has a heavier presence in the Mid-Atlantic, Midwest and Southeast and wants to grow its reach to more Americans in the West. It waded into that market several years ago with its

\$11.6 billion purchase of the U.S. arm of BBVA.

The FirstBank acquisition would make PNC the top bank by retail-deposit and branch share in Denver, which it expects to become one of the largest markets for its commercial and business bank.

The acquisition is expected to close early next year. PNC said it will then convert FirstBank customers to its platform.
